PARK PLACE OF ST. JOHN Phase II Update

Construction is underway once again at Park Place of St. John, and several people have already placed deposits for apartments in the new wing of the building.

The growing retirement community tucked within the Gates of St. John neighborhood is buzzing with anticipation at the new building and new neighbors soon to join them.





With initial planning and groundbreaking completed, construction is well underway for Phase II of Park Place of St. John retirement living apartments, which will allow more than 50 new residents to move in.

Staff are now working with depositors, in the order they signed up, to make reservations. So far, nineteen residents have selected their apartments, complete with their choice of cabinets and countertops. More residents are meeting with staff to make their decisions each week. Those who made their reservation before October 31st had the benefit of a waived community fee, as well as choice of interiors, apartment plans, and garages.

Each resident is joining an already full, vibrant community. This past year, residents at Park Place have celebrated Cinco de Mayo, attended Grandparents Day at Crown Point Christian School, hosted Village Woods for a Wii bowling tournament, gone out for dinner, and gathered for a hymn sing. This is the active community that new residents will be welcomed into.

Community excitement is growing, too, as Park Place of St. John hosts events to promote the new

addition to the retirement community. Depositors shared a trip to the Shrine of Christ's Passion, toured the site in club cars, then went out to Teibel's for a delicious lunch. After lunch, the group was invited back to Park Place to see progress on construction and learn more about SeniorFit, the exercise program Park Place implements to give residents an opportunity to exercise safely and effectively. Several other events are planned in the months to come. These events help build



friendships and the sense of community that have made Park Place of St. John such a special place to call home.

Construction began mid-March of 2018. Most of the exterior windows and doors have been installed, and interior major mechanicals are also nearly completed. Insulation has begun, with drywall soon to follow, as well as interior paint, flooring, millwork, and all the finishes. The anticipated completion of construction is July 2019. |

TALE OF TIME AS POW

Don Thomas, a Park Place Elmhurst resident for the past two years, always had a spirit of adventure.

Don's life includes stories of hitchhiking across the country, of a championship high school basketball season, and life growing up in Minnesota. But his most compelling story is of his time in World War II, when he escaped Prisoner of War camp, not once, but two times.

He never intended to join the military; he had plans to study chemical engineering at the Uni-

versity of Minnesota. He was a bright student, but his adventurous spirit kept him out of class. Though he aced most of his tests, he was in danger of failing.

So Don entered into active military service in February of 1941 — less than a year later, and just days after the attack on Pearl Harbor, his unit was sent on a long trek: first by train, then by boat, to Belfast.

Don went on to fight in several successful campaigns, particularly in Italy. But on a reconnaissance mission near Anzio in January of 1944, a landmine exploded under the jeep he was in, killing all the other passengers and knocking him unconscious. He awoke to a group of German infantrymen pointing guns at him.

The Germans took Don prisoner, marching him through the

streets of Rome. He then went to POW camp in Leipzig. He and a friend escaped by walking away during a work assignment in the woods, and with help from a Polish farmer who helped hide them in the hay in his barn.

However, when he was re-captured shortly after his escape, the Germans made an example of him, pistol-whipping him and knocking out his front teeth, then throwing him in solitary confinement. He was later marched to a new camp in freezing conditions,

many of his companions dying on the road, but Don's spirit and passion persevered. After enduring many other hardships and dire circumstances, Don made another escape. A small compass, hidden by the Red Cross in a shaving brush at the work camps, helped him find his way back to safety.

Don eventually received his second Purple Heart and Honorable Discharge from the Army. He went back to the University of Minnesota and graduated Magna Cum Laude with degrees in both

Chemical Engineering and Business Administration.

Now Don and Mavis enjoy their retirement at Park Place, warmly welcoming guests who want to hear Don's tales and enjoy Mavis's hospitality.

CMS looks at aspects of each community to rate each category between 1 and 5 stars. These ratings are assessed quarterly and help in the decision about where to go for service.

Why Choose a Continuum of Care Community?

Many families are choosing senior communities that offer all levels of care, and for good reason.

Irene finished mowing her lawn, and took a moment to rest in her back yard, wiping sweat from her forehead. She looked at the beautiful yard where her children played growing up, and where her grandchildren now visit. Beyond the yard, she saw her house, a home where she had lived with her husband for 42 years, where she had raised four children. She loved her house and the memories it held for her.

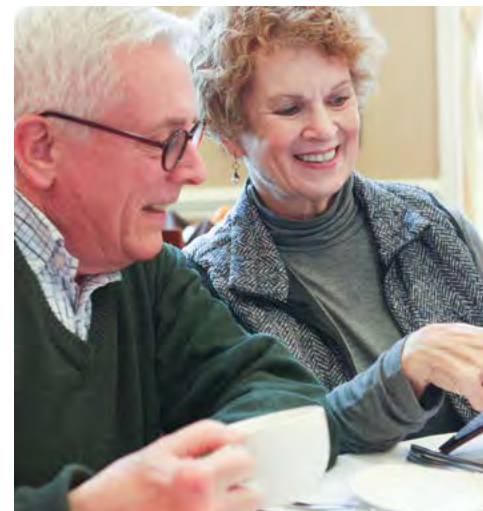
But recently widowed at age 70, she didn't want to mow her lawn or rake her leaves anymore. She didn't want to spend her day dusting and sweeping in her four-bedroom house. Her kids had talked

to her about downsizing, and Irene decided she was finally ready—but where should she go? Should she move to a condo down the street in an apartment building just for seniors? Or should she move to a senior living community that offered a continuum of care?

Irene is one of many retirees who are ready to take the step to maintenance-free senior living, but are not sure which path to take. And while many people enjoy rich, fulfilling lives in senior condos, they don't provide any medical or health assistance. A continuum of care community offers the independence you want, but assistance when you need it. Many

of Providence's senior communities offer different levels of care, all on the same campus.

Located in Homer Glen, Victorian Village offers a continuum of care on their campus. Seniors looking for retirement living can choose to live in The Courts, a cluster of townhomes, or at the Grand Victorian, where several different apartment styles are available. Both the Courts and Grand Victorian residents are able to take part in various activities and outings suited for people who don't need assistance, but want to enjoy a maintenance-free lifestyle. When the time comes that their health needs become greater, they

have two options: they can hire in-home services from Providence at Home, or they can move to another building on campus: the Victorian Inn.

Residents at the Victorian Inn are able to receive assistance with the activities of daily living, as well as specialized Memory Care services that they may need. They also have access to activities and events tailored with their needs in mind. While the Grand Victorian and the Victorian Inn both have separate entertainment and events planned, they mingle with each other.

“We encourage people to cross over as much as possible,” Connie Jaros, Life Enrichment Director at Victorian Village says. “Because people move over to the Inn from the Grand fairly often, they usually have friends in both levels of care. We do have three separate calendars for all three levels of care,

but everyone still enjoys the same activities together.”

When residents’ physical needs become more advanced, they move to the Small Houses at Victorian Village. In the Small House, residents enjoy a large common area and an open kitchen and eating space, with plenty of room to sit and visit with family. Small houses have only ten people, each living in private rooms. Care Partners are able to provide the attentive skilled nursing and memory care residents need. Residents are also offered activities specifically designed for their lives in a setting that looks and feels like home, and often join residents from the Grand Victorian and Victorian Inn for entertainment and events.

Post-acute rehabilitation care is also offered Small-House style. When residents at Victorian Village need rehab services after an illness, injury, or surgery, they

often choose to complete rehab right at Victorian Village, in the same community where they live. They receive skilled rehab services from health professionals who work to get them back on track and ready to go home.

Many families choose a continuum of care community because of the comfort and peace of mind they receive, knowing that all their care can be provided on one campus, and they will never have to move simply because of an increase in their care needs.

Providence offers a continuum of Retirement Living and Health-care at our communities in Zeeland, Michigan; St. John, Indiana; and Homer Glen, Crete, Elmhurst, and Downers Grove, Illinois. |

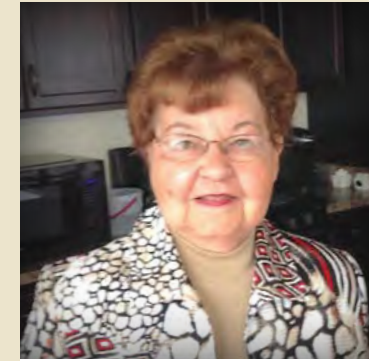
"We're really happy here," Jean says. "I'm glad we moved here together, when it was still our choice and we're able to enjoy it. We're not moving anywhere else." ■

We had a two-story on a lake, with all our bedrooms upstairs. We had a lot of get-togethers and holidays there. It was a fun place to have kids."

Then Carol's husband had open heart surgery, and later was diagnosed with leukemia. "It got hard to live there," Carol says. "Bedrooms upstairs meant we had to install a chair to help him up the stairs. The bathtub was too difficult for him to safely step into. One day he said, 'We can't keep fixing this house for me.' They both loved the model apartment they saw during construction and planned to move in when Park Place opened, but Carol's husband passed away before they could move in. She decided to keep the same apartment, and she has no regrets. Her grandkids and daughter have stayed overnight in the spare bedroom, and she still uses her garage, right across the hall.

A few years ago, when Anamae and Michelle still lived in nearby Lombard, Anamae came to Providence Healthcare and Rehabilitation Center in Downers Grove for rehabilitation. That was when Michelle first learned of respite care.

“I didn’t even know what that was,” Michelle says.

Since January of 2014, Anamae has stayed at Saratoga Grove for short respite visits 3-4 times a year. And now that they live in Florida, Michelle and Anamae fly here every time they need respite care—just for Saratoga Grove.

“People ask, ‘You can’t find a place closer to home?’ and I tell them that I’ve tried,” Michelle says. “But it’s a place where I don’t have to worry. When she’s here, it’s the only time I’m not with her that I’m 100% at peace.”

“That peace of mind is what matters,” she says. “It’s worth the trip.” ✿

Phil's Friends has been around for almost 10 years, with thousands of volunteers supporting those struggling with cancer by providing kindness. Park Place residents support Phil's Friends by supplying handmade hats.

"I did it with my church before I lived here," Aleda Dekker says as she expertly works her fingers around the pegs of her loom. "I thought maybe others would want to do it here, too."

In a short time, the group of loomers has gone from just a few residents to almost 15, along with 3 other ladies from Aleda's church. Many get to the dining room early and stay late.

Knitting with a loom takes skill and dexterity. And it isn't just the

ladies that take part in the activity. One woman's husband helps while they watch Sunday football in front of the television.

Gina Ringo, Park Place Life Enrichment Director, makes sure the yarn keeps flowing. "Everyone goes at their own pace," she says. "Some people only work on the hats when they're down here with the club, and others work on it all week long, whenever they get a chance. We have one woman who sometimes makes 4 hats in a week."

The extra time the residents take to make hats outside the club is evidenced by the sheer number of hats they've produced.

"We donated over 200 hats by the end of the year. That's pretty impressive, since it takes several hours to make one hat," Gina says.

And watching the practiced fingers working on these hats, 200 hats is amazing.

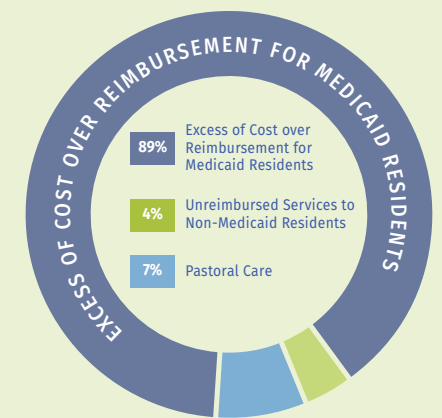
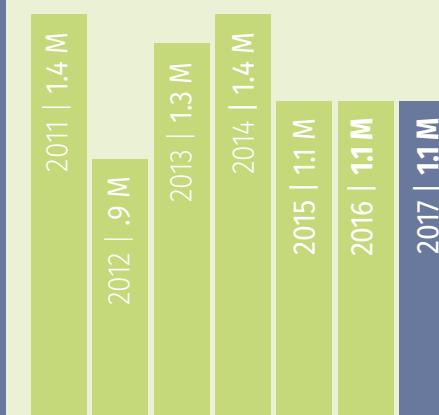


Source of Revenue

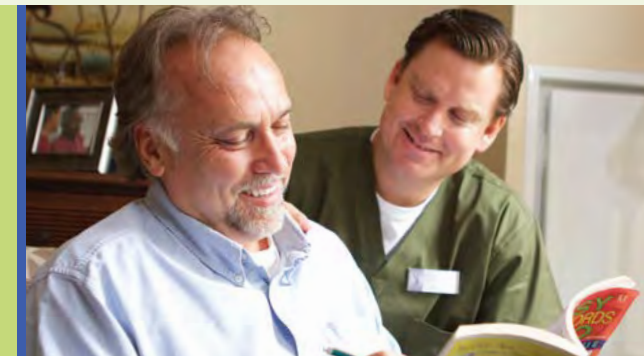

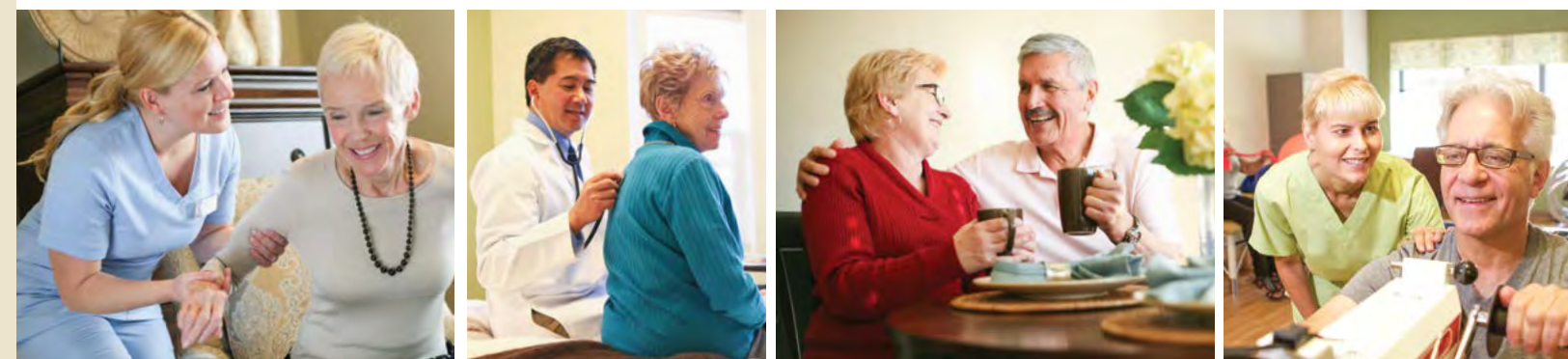
